Moved by Geo. Olmstead seconded by Alden May that Council appoint Mr. Arthur Somerville as spraying Inspector for the year 1966 at the rate of \$1.60 per hour. A by-law for this purpose was set up.

Moved by George Olmstead, seconded by H. Pilgrim that Council accept the resignation of Selma Bennett as the Representative for the Township on the Cobden-Cyanville District High School Board.

Foresters Falls, Ont. April 6th 1966

Regular monthly meeting of Ross Municipal Council met on above date with all members present

Minutes of last meetings were read and adopted and signed by the Pres.

Moved by Geo. Olmstead, seconded by H. Pilgrim that council revert to the former by-law whereby tax collections are made twice yearly, payments to become due on June 30th 1966 and December 20th 1966 and that we draft and pass a by-law to this effect.

Three tenders were received for crushing hauling and spreading gravel on township roads and also stockpiling from Cady & Graham, Kinturn, Hoffman Concrete Co. of Petawawa and Herb. Bunn of Pembroke 75¢ and 50¢ plus .5¢ per ton for furnishing gravel.

It was moved by Wm. Stone, seconded by Alden May that council accept the tender of Herb. Bunn of Pembroke at a price of .75¢ per ton plus .05¢ per ton ^{to furnish gravel} for crushing, hauling and spreading gravel on township roads and .50¢ per ton plus .05¢ per ton to furnish gravel for stockpiling, subject to the approval of the Department of Highways

Moved by Alden May, seconded by Wm. Stone that council accept the tender of Stafford M. Miller ^{for culverts} as per list price less 3% discount from list price

Moved by Geo. Olmstead seconded by H. Pilgrim that we accept the tender of D. N. Bell & Son for the supplying of the following fencing supplies for the year 1966: Wire \$1.23 per rod, Posts .97¢ each, 16 ft gates \$23.95.

Moved by Geo. Olmstead, seconded by Alden May that Council apply to the Department of Highways to have the roads designated on by-law No 879 passed in 1966 subject to their approval

Foresters Falls, Ont. March 3d 1966

A special meeting of council was called on above date to consider a by-law for recreational purposes and also to consider road matters with an official of the Department of Highways who was present. Also to discuss tenders for gravel, and fencing requirements and culverts.

Matters pertaining to road matters were discussed with the official of the Department of Highways at which the council made some suggestions ^{and} which he informed council he would present to the Department for their consideration.

It was moved by George Almstead, seconded by Alden May that council rescind all former by-laws in connection with recreational activities in the Township and that we give first and second reading to a by-law to authorize the carrying on of a Community Programme within the Township as outlined by the Department of Education.

Moved by Wm. Stone, seconded by St. Pilgrim that council call tenders for the crushing hauling and spreading on Township roads of 18,000 tons of gravel to pass through a 5/8 in. screen, 10,000 tons for maintenance and 8,000 tons for construction. Also prices for stockpiling. Contractor to clean off pit.

Moved by Geo. Almstead, seconded by Alden May that council call tenders for the fencing material. Wire 8 strand even spacing 42" high, posts 7 ft. steel, Gates 16 ft. Also prices on all sizes of culverts.

A special meeting of Pars Municipal Council was called on above date for the purpose of dealing with Road Appropriation by-law for 1966, the appointing of a Spraying Inspector for 1966 and the resignation of Selman Bennett as Representative to the Cobden-Bramville District High School board.

It was moved by Wm. Stone, seconded by Alden May that Council accept the Road Appropriation by-law in the amount of \$90,000 as provided by the Department of Highways apportioned as follows:
